GIRLS BOX CHAMPIONSHIPS DOMINATED BY TIGHT GAMES

The Kingston Crossfire battled it out against the Six Nations Warriors for the Girls Intermediate A title. Cassidy Neill scored just 30 seconds into the game to give Kingston the early lead. This would be the only lead of the game for Kingston, as Six Nations was up 2-1 after the first period and didn't look back. Julianne Sandy shut the door for the Warriors and led the team to a 5-2 victory. Fawn Porter scored twice in the Championship win.

The Girls Intermediate B Championship saw the Kitchener-Waterloo Braves take on the Orillia Kings. Avery Holmes registered the only goal of the first period, her first of two, to give Orillia a 1-0 lead at the first break. Hunter Johns would score the Brave's only goal mid-way through the second frame. Shelby Ludlow would shut the door for the remainder of the game, leading Orillia to a 4-1 win in the final.

A tightly contested Girls Intermediate C Final saw the Hamilton Bengals do battle with the Mississauga Tomahawks. The teams scored once each in both first and second periods, leaving the game deadlocked at 2-2 heading into the final frame. Victoria Verhaeghe would be the hero for Hamilton, scoring the only third period goal for either team, and giving Hamilton the 3-2 Championship victory.

The Girls Midget A Championship game was played between the Peterborough Lakers and the Kitchener-Waterloo Braves. Goals by Chelsea Campbell and Mackenzie Manuliak had the game drawn at 1-1 after the first period. Kitchener would gain an edge scoring the only second period goal and taking a 2-1 lead into the final frame. Erika Hill tied the game up for Peterborough with less than five minutes to play, but less than a minute later Maddy Bourque put Kitchener back in front by a score of 3-2. This lead would hold up as Kitchener became the Girls Midget A champs.

The Guelph Regals took on the Nepean Knights in the Girls Midget B finals. A back and forth first period left the teams tied at 2-2 at the conclusion of the period. Kassi Hogan would score her second goal of the game, early in the second period, to give

Guelph the lead. Defense would be the story for the remainder of the game, as Hogan's goal would hold up to give Guelph the 3-2 Championship victory.

The Girls Midget C Final was another close matchup, featuring the London Blue Devils and the Six Nations Warriors. Kaitlyn Tauschek and Hailee Johnson would be the only regulation goal scorers in this one, as the teams headed to overtime tied 1-1. Both teams scored within a minute of each other in the overtime frame, keeping things tied until the 1:21 mark when Johnson completed her hat trick and gave Six Nations a 3-2 lead. The overtime goal would hold up to make Six Nations your Girls Midget C champs.

The Girls Bantam A final was a comeback thriller featuring the Whitby Warriors and Peterborough Lakers. Peterborough came out flying, taking a 3-1 lead into the first intermission. Taya Keast's goal, seconds into period number 2, extended the Peterborough lead to 4-1. Whitby, amazingly, rallied to score 5 unanswered goals, all from different players, to win the game 6-4 and capture the Bantam A title.

The Bantam B Championship was a defensive faceoff between the Nepean Knights and the Simcoe Timberwolves. The contest was a goaltending duel between Abbey Thompson and Megan Carrier, with only one goal being scored by either team. Early in the second period, Amy Hradecky scored the game's only goal for Nepean, helping them capture the Bantam B banner.

The Pee Wee A banner was up for grabs in another matchup between the Peterborough Lakers and the Whitby Warriors. Both teams scored twice in the first period, but that was the closest the game would stay. Peterborough goalkeeper Ashley Cowdon would not allow another goal until the final two minutes of the game, allowing her team to pull away. Stella Burke exploded for four goals in the game, leading Peterborough to a 6-3 victory.
